RESEARCH PROPOSAL (SEM-II, UNIT IV)

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RESEARCH PROPOSAL

- A Research proposal describes
 - what you will investigate
 - why it is important
 - how will you do the research
- The goal of a Research Proposal is:
 - 1. To present and justify the need to study a research problem
 - 2. To present the practical ways of in which the proposed study should be conducted

WRITING A RESEARCH PROPOSAL

- Regardless of the research problem you are investigating and the methodology you choose , all research proposals must address the following questions:
 - 1. What do you plan to accomplish?
 - 2. Why do you want to do the research?
 - 3. How are you going to conduct the research?

STRUCTURE & WRITING STYLE

- A Research proposal should include the following sections:
- Introduction
- Background and Significance
- Literature review
- Research design and methods
- Preliminary suppositions and Implications
- Conclusion
- Citations

INTRODUCTION

- The first step in getting approval to write a Doctoral Dissertation(thesis)
- Treat your introduction as the initial pitch of an idea or a thorough examination of the significance of research problem
- Readers should have a clear understanding of what you want to do
- They should also be able to gain a sense of your passion for the topic and to be excited about the study's possible outcomes.

BACKGROUND AND SIGNIFICANCE

- This is where you explain the content of your proposal
- Describe in detail why is it important
- Can be melded into your introduction
- Approach writing this section with the thought that your readers don't know much about the problem
- Choose what is most relevant in explaining the aims of your research
- Don't write an essay

LITERATURE REVIEW

- The Purpose here is to place your project within the larger whole of what is currently being explored
- To give a more deliberate review and synthesis of prior studies related to the research problem under investigation
- Think about what questions other researchers have asked, what methods they have used, what is your understanding of their findings

RESEARCH DESIGN AND METHODS

- This section should lay out, in clear terms, the way in which you will structure your research and the specific methods you will use
- Must be well written and logically organised
- The objective here is to convince the reader that your overall research design and proposed methods of analysis will correctly address the problem and interpret the potential results

PRELIMINARY SUPPOSITIONS AND IMPLICATIONS

- The purpose here is to argue how and in what ways you believe your research will refine, revise or extend existing knowledge in the subject area
- To reflect upon gaps or understudied areas of the current literature
- To describe how your proposed research contributes to a new understanding of the research problem

CONCLUSION

- To reiterate the importance or significance of your proposal and provide a brief summary of the entire study
- Should be only one or two paragraphs long
- Emphasize why the research problem is worth investigating and how it should advance the existing knowledge.

CITATIONS

- One must cite the sources used
- In a standard research proposal this section can take two forms: References & Bibliography

References: Lists only the literature that you actually used or cited in your proposal Bibliography: Lists everything you used or cited in your proposal.
